Interim local government reorganisation plan has now been submitted



On 18th March ECC Cabinet agreed that the <u>interim plan for local government</u> reorganisation in <u>Greater Essex</u> should be submitted to government.

Each of the other 14 Essex authorities held special meetings to debate it and everyone agreed it likewise.

The plan was then duly submitted on 21st March 2025.

This sets out how changing council structures in the county would help us to be more efficient. Delivery of essential services would be more streamlined. We will also be able to reduce duplication and achieve more for less for our residents.

At this stage, there is no confirmation of how many councils there will be in the future. Along with partners, we will be gathering evidence to inform the final business cases. These will be shared with government in September.

The Government will then make the final decision for Greater Essex.

Leader of the Council, Councillor Kevin Bentley, said: "This is a momentous point in our collective journey to improve the lives of our residents, ensure they

have access to better opportunities, and to transform local services – now and in the future.

"All 15 councils and the office of the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner in Greater Essex have worked incredibly hard to develop this joint submission which, I am proud to say, has residents and businesses at its heart. We are not only doing this for the people of Essex now, but for future generations who will benefit too.

"Local government reorganisation is about bringing decision making about essential services closer to people - something we know is important to them. Our work will always be about ensuring the voices of cities, towns and villages are heard, and this will be a continued focus in the detailed plans.

"We don't underestimate the scale of what is being proposed. Work will continue between now and September to gather evidence and inform the final structures that will help us to achieve economies of scale and protect vital front-line services from unnecessary risk.

"We need to ensure the new councils – however many this turns out to be - are sustainable. The Government will consider this as part of their final decision and so we must get this once-in-a-generation opportunity right.

"We remain fully committed to continue working with our partners over the coming months to secure the long-term future of our great county."

Tendring DC's Chief Executive Ian Davidson was instrumental in having secured all 15 Councils agreement and he has been tasked with progressing the next complex stage of the full submission to Government in September 2025.

£6 million boost to tackle fuel poverty in Essex



Essex has been awarded £6 million to tackle fuel poverty and reduce carbon emissions over the next three years.

The money is from the Warm Homes: Local Grant, managed by the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero. We bid for funding with the district, city, borough and unitary councils in the county. It will be used for measures including heat pumps, solar panels and insulation.

Applications to receive help from the Warm Homes Local Grant in Essex will open in the summer. Homes will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis. This will determine which energy efficiency measures can be installed.

The Warm Homes: Local Grant is aimed at low-income and vulnerable households. This includes both owned and rented properties.

Essex County Council Climate Czar and Cabinet Member for Environment, Waste Reduction and Recycling, Councillor Peter Schwier, said: "We're pleased our partnership bid was successful. This new funding will make a major difference the county's most vulnerable residents over the coming years.

"No one should be living in fuel poverty. This, and climate change, are two significant issues we are continuing to take extremely seriously in Essex.

"Working with our partners, we continue to look for new ways to improve the lives of our residents and protect the environment, now and for the future."

The new grant is the first step to help delivering the <u>Warm Homes Plan</u>. The plan will help up to 300,000 homes across England find ways to save money on energy bills. It will also help to heat homes with cleaner energy.

The partnership bid for funding did not include Basildon Council which submitted its own bid.

A key part of the programme will be improving access to education, training and jobs. We will build on best practice, scale up existing projects and aim to close the gap between employment and education.

Essex Year of Numbers



Launched in 2023, the Essex Year of Numbers was a countywide campaign that aimed to inspire a love of learning, with a focus on numeracy. It came in response to evidence from UK charity, National Numeracy, that shows a link between low numeracy skills and debt, unemployment, and even poor health. Essex Year of Numbers provided pupils with new opportunities, resources and knowledge to feel more confident using maths.

On Tuesday 4 March we celebrated the Essex Year of Numbers at an event at the Hylands Estate, bringing contributors, experts and young people together to look back on the extraordinary work over the last 12 months. The Essex Year of Reading

Launched in 2022, <u>the Essex Year of Reading</u> helped children, young people and adults discover a love of reading. Multiple projects involved primary, secondary and SEND schools across Essex. Guidance and resources are still available.

Eco Refill project

Launched in collaboration with <u>Pupils Profit</u>, the Eco Refill project enabled primary school aged children aged nine and above to set up and operate their own monthly Eco Refill shops on school premises.

97% of children offered places at preferred secondary schools



On 3rd March 2025 parents of 16,758 pupils found out about their secondary school applications.

In total, 97% of parents are being offered one of their school preferences for the 2025 academic year. 83.86% are being offered their first preference and a further 8.72% are being offered their second preference.

This means 92.58% of children have been offered either their parents' first or second preference.

This year, 99% of families applied online and will receive their offer by email or our website.

Councillor Tony Ball, our Cabinet Member for Education Excellence, Lifelong Learning and Employability, said: "I am really pleased to see that, once again, we have been able to offer so many pupils their parents' preferred secondary school place this year.

"Starting secondary school is a hugely important milestone in a child's life and I hope those embarking on this exciting next step enjoy their last few months at primary and junior school before starting their next academic adventure."
