Speeding

Essex Police takes speeding very seriously.

Excessive and inappropriate speed is the cause of many road traffic collisions throughout the county every year and has been identified as a priority for many communities through neighbourhood policing.

Our officers take a robust approach to speeding drivers 365 days a year and are continually stepping up efforts to catch irresponsible drivers who choose to ignore speed limits.

One of the ways in which Essex Police does this is by setting up random static speed checks up and down the county.

Police officers use hand held laser devices to detect speeding vehicles and interact with the driver or rider and promote safety messages.

Since 2007 Community Speed Watch groups throughout the county have been supporting Essex Police and its partners in their efforts to change rider behaviour and make the roads of Essex a safer place.

Police Activities.

Unfortunately we have some sad news to share.

Police searching for missing Clacton man Alex Wagner have found a body. The body was discovered in Lodge Lane, Little Clacton, at just before 11am yesterday.

No formal identification has taken place yet but his next of kin have been informed and the search has been suspended.

Non-dwelling burglaries (sheds, garages and shops etc) continue to be an issue in and around the Harwich area. Residents are strongly urged to ensure security is as good as it can be and lighting with sensors is installed where practicable to deter burglars from entering rear gardens and rear of business premises.

There has been a reduction in the number of dwelling burglaries in the Harwich area recently. However, residents are urged to remain vigilant to help prevent further burglaries in the area. Certain individuals are still being targeted by both uniformed and covert officers.

On 15th March two males were arrested in Clacton for criminal damage to an automatic hotel door.

NHW Information

At our recent open NHW meeting, one of the members asked the police who were present "You have heard what we want from the police but what do the police want from us" The reply was "Ring us straight away if you see something suspicious or a crime happening, don't wait till the next day and speak to someone about it before contacting us" Very true, I have come across this time & time again but make sure you obtain an incident number from the operator you speak to, don't be fobbed off with "You don't need one". There must be an incident report created and hence a number allocated.

Crime Data is now available for the Public to view and it is located on the Police.uk website, in an area called 'Compare Your Area'. This will provide you with tailored charts on (a) crime rates in your CSP (Community Safety Partnership) compared with most similar areas; (b) crime rates in the CSP compared with other CSPs in force area; and (c) trends over time for the CSP, the CSP's most similar group average and for the force area as a whole. The launch date of the Compare Your Area site on Police.uk was Monday **October 15th 2012**
